Working Title: Anna's Story

We are a group of 4 college students who are in the process of creating a documentary using archival footage that we have been given access, as well as onsite interviews and some cinema verite scenes that we will shoot in October. The subject is about a highschool girl from Kentucky, named Anna, who is a goalkeeper for her school soccer team. Through the documentary we see her going to Haiti to serve orphans, medical centers, and many other places. Upon her return, she is diagnosed with a severe infection and spends much time fighting for her life. Amazingly, she recovers and is fit to play in time for the soccer post-season. During the playoffs, she leads her team to win the state tournament. We plan to tell the story through the voice of her mother who was a key supporting character through Anna's experience.

We believe that this is an inspirational story that will encourage many sports athletes who have suffered injuries and sickness, as well as any person who has or is going through a very difficult situation in life. This story is one that tells of a girl who is an ordinary Midwestern individual who has big dreams and who overcomes great obstacles to achieve these goals. Our target audience includes people who enjoy sports, young adults, missions organizations, those interested in medical recoveries,



people who have had E Coli, and those who find recovery stories inspirational.

We are requesting of the Hansen Family Foundation for a grant of \$2500 to help us tell this story. Were the Hansen Family Foundation to give us said amount, we would be able to hire both a sound and color correction designer. Having these individuals on the team would greatly enhance the documentary and would create an opportunity for Anna's story to be told across the Midwest so that it can reach a large population.

Our team is composed of four film students who have all had experience on production teams. Our Producer Brianna Jordahl helped on the documentary team that created *Joy: A Tale of Two Adoption Stories* and has created many projects on her own. Tyler Kempton, both our Director and Director of Photography, has created short films and worked on sports marketing videography. Our Editor, Heather Stedt, is Avid certified and has edited many short films. Hudson Farrell, the Associate Producer and Assistant Editor, has created multiple short films, has been on set for multiple productions, and has a lot of editing experience throughout school and jobs.

Logistically, our team believes that this project is very feasible. We have already been granted access to archival footage of Anna's trip to Haiti, her battle with E Coli, and multiple postseason games. Our team is located around 4 hours away from Anna, and we have already arranged time during two weekends to go down and film her and her family. We are also in communication with multiple key individuals about scheduling interviews. They will be able to speak on Anna's impacting recovery, and her contribution to winning the state tournament. We also have a mutual agreement



with Taylor University's Film and Media Department to use two cameras, lighting equipment, audio equipment, a large van, and have been given \$600 to finish production. We plan to use the \$600 on travel expenses and possibly to gain rights to the television footage of Anna's team during the postseason. We anticipate most of the money to be expended on gas, tolls, and food. With access to the resources mentioned above, we believe that we have the primary tools in place to create this ten minute documentary.



Documentary Treatment for Rise: The Anna Rexford Story

Date: 12/09/17

We begin by seeing Tracy describe Anna's development as a soccer player. We see various photos of her playing as a young girl. Ali then speaks toward Anna's heart for people and missions. Photos of her with people pan across the screen. Tracy briefly describes setting up a trip for her and Anna to go to Haiti. Then, as Anna speaks about her time in Haiti, we see video clips and photos of Anna in Haiti, highlighting her time spent with the Haitian kids. During the viewing of these clips, we hear her mom's reflections on how Anna put 110% into everything, loving everyone around her. Tracy then speaks toward returning home and how Anna began to feel sick. We see a series of reenactment scenes of Anna developing symptoms of her severe sickness as Tracy talks. She tells the story of the night they returned home and Anna's quick decline in health, not knowing what the issues were with Anna and them deciding to get help. The screen fades to black.

We are introduced to Priya, who speaks on an academic level toward the severity of Anna's health. Tracy tells us that Anna was diagnosed with E-Coli and we see a Facebook post Tracy sent to friends explaining the seriousness of Anna's condition. We see photos of Anna in the hospital and footage from that time. Anna describes how she looks back and wonders at how sick she was. Tracy tells us how in that time it was a time of crying out in fear and in hope and praying for confirmation that God never left their side. The screen fades to black.

Following this, Cori explains her connection to Anna. Then Anna describes interactions with Cori and we see footage and images of Anna getting better and smiles returning to her face. Ali then talks about when Anna came home and we see a picture of her welcoming Anna back. Tracy then speaks toward Anna's slow progress to get onto the soccer field. We see footage of Anna's team practicing. Tracy and Anna then describe how she was called up at postseason to start as goalkeeper. The screen fades to black.

The next portion is a montage of pictures and video clips of Anna and her team, the West Jessamine Colts, progressing through the State tournament. This section is amplified with music and sound bites of commentators talking about big plays Anna makes. This ends with Anna's team shown to have won the State tournament and a picture of Anna holding the trophy. The screen fades to black.

Then we hear a voice, with subtitles, announce the winner of the MVP award. As he says Anna's name, we fade up onto a clip of Anna walking to receive her award.

Tracy then tells us Anna won the MVP award. The screen fades to black.

We fade up onto a cinema verite scene of Cori and Anna reuniting for the first time after a year since Anna was in the hospital. Cori talks about Anna's amazing determination, and they embrace. Then we overlay Tracy talking about Anna's two journeys. Images of her in the hospital and then a soccer clip are shown as Tracy

Beat Sheet

Logline: Hugo and Theodore decide to have an "all-natural" week for food. Hugo teaches the campers proper eating etiquette and diet, but it turns into chaos as campers begin to eat everything green. Audrey develops a conspiracy theory that Theo is hiding a dead body.

Teaser: Hugo and Theodore, dressed in hiking gear and holding big plastic Walmart bags, are in the woods. Theodore sets up an animal trap and explains to Hugo how hunting used to be a basic part of human survival. They wait and watch the trap. A bunny slowly comes up to the trap, steps into the trap, eats the bait, and then hops off. Hugo and Theodore look at each other and then race after the bunny.

Act 1

Scene 1 (develop A)

Campers stare down at plates of salad and greens in disgust as Hugo explains to the kids the importance of eating healthy. Leo pushes his own plate away and makes a face at Hugo who pretends not to notice. Off-scene Theodore explains to the camera, "It's natural. These kids are going to be so healthy." He smiles at the camera and then eats a carrot with dirt on it, coughs some out, and then smiles again at the camera and takes another bite. Returning to the dining commons, kids shove their plates towards a skinny kid named Blake who gladly takes all the food.

Scene 2 (introduce B)

Meanwhile, Scott and Audrey, covered in sweat and dirt, busily pick vegetables on hands and knees from Theo's garden. Audrey fires questions at Scott about Theo. He replies with frustration to the outrageous questions about how Theo got enough money to buy the camp and why he lives in the middle of the woods with a grumble and a, "How should I know?" Audrey suddenly points out a suspicious looking pile of dirt over near some trees. The two go and investigate, albeit Scott only goes because Audrey reminded him of the time she ate his broccoli for him while Hugo wasn't looking. Upon seeing the mound up close Audrey begins to act very strange and starts looking around with big eyes. "Scott", she whispers. "What Audrey?" He replies dryly. "That's a body... Theo murdered someone". Scott doesn't believe her and the two gather the vegetables and head back to camp. Interview with Audrey, "I killed 22 people in one day... I know what a buried body looks like when I see one".

Scene 3 (A story complication)

Back at camp, Hugo and Theo have gathered the campers together and take them on a nature walk through the woods to point out which plants they can eat. The campers try the various plants that Theo and Hugo state as having nutritional value. During an interview with Hugo he talks about how much calcium ferns have and it shows him teaching a camper how to properly eat a fern. Meanwhile Theo

picks some mushrooms and then turns to the camera to tell it how good they are for soup. In the background a kid begins eating a stick. Blake runs up to Theo and shows him a bunch of wild carrots that he found. When asked about the kid Theo says, "He's got a natural vibe to him... I like him."

Commercial Break

Act 2

Scene 1 (C, develops new plan)

Leo gathers some campers together to have a secret meeting. Acting as the leader of a formal group he gives the campers a pep talk, "Today is a step for Camp Dingawaka, today is a day for mankind". The campers cheer "Ooooh-Rah!" Leo proceeds to show the campers how to make stone spears. The group begins to practice sneaking stealthily through the woods. Leo tiptoes quickly making a ton of noise as he demonstrates 'proper' form of the art of sneaking. When asked about his stealth he replies to the camera, "It's not about not making the noise, but about not being the one to hear the noise..." Campers crash through the woods, purposefully jumping on twigs in order to be as noisy as Leo. One camper is interviewed and says to the camera, "I always wanted to be a Boy Scout" The camper motions to Leo and shouts, "Oooh-rah!".

Scene 2 (B story complication)

In the camp offices Audrey drags Scott into a room and shows him a computer screen with a list of recent murders. Scott rolls his eyes at Audrey, "Audrey, this is... is way over the top". She pretends not to hear him and begins to list off the recent murders. She pauses and then looks at Scott and then says, "There's one last week, two miles from here". Scott goes over to the screen and looks at the screen and then at Audrey. He says to Audrey, "Theo was gone for a couple days last week." They look at each other. Audrey tells the camera, "I'm going to keep digging... and not for the body."

Scene 3 (A story crisis)

Hugo and Theo lose control of the kids as they begin to take the all-natural advice to extremes. Some campers are down at a stream and drink the water while Theo tries to explain to them that the water is not clean. Hugo races frantically towards a group of kids eating poison ivy waving his arms trying to get them to stop. Some campers assemble plants onto rocks and make salads from the random plants they found. One camper shows the camper his tongue and its red rash from the poison ivy. In an interview Theo tells the camera, "Bro, this is not chill..." and then smiles and says, "but did you see that kid's tongue? Pretty cool man."

Commercial Break

Act 3

Scene 1 (C story twist)

Leo's group of campers loudly approach the part of the forrest where Hugo and Theo's group is. Holding sticks with cooked rabbits tied to them, they chant to the campers "Oooh-rah! Oooh-rah! We are clan oooh-rah!" They raise their spears and chant louder. Hugo and Theo look on in bewilderment. The other campers seeing the cooked rabbits, start chanting "Oooh-rah", and run over to join them. Interviewing Leo on where he got the idea for clans, he responds, "Well, I used to be a professional at Clash of Clans... so that might have something to do with it."

Scene 2 (B story twist)

Still at the computer and searching the internet, Audrey and Scott update the camera on what they have found. Audrey types something into the computer and then looks up at the camera and looks around, and then whispers, "come here." As the camera comes it reveals the computer screen with a picture of Hugo and Theo in very low resolution next to a picture of the suspected murderers. In an interview, Scott speaks to the camera, "Audrey says she found it online... I believe her." They talk about how to best arrest Theo and then they look at a map of the camp. "You go here and then I'll come out here and then I'll tackle him" explains Audrey. In an interview she tells the camera, "My tackling skills are much better than my photoshop skills".

Scene 3 (A story climax)

Hugo and Theo have rallied the campers together at the campground with the help of Leo's clan. They organize themselves into groups of five and as Leo shouts "Oooh-rah!" and they yell back. Hugo brings out a wheelbarrow of hotdogs followed by some campers carrying buckets full of hotdogs. Theo says to the camera, "Have we failed our mission? Not really, hot dogs are all natural..." and he shows the camera a packaging of a natural turkey hot dog, "and a good eating competition is rad". Hugo yells through a microphone to the campers and tells them to start eating. All the kids ravenously begin to eat the hundreds of hot dogs. Blake chews on a hot dog and then spits it out. The eating competition becomes a bit rowdy when some campers begin to throw hotdogs at each other. After a bit of shouting and cheering with ketchup and mustard flying everywhere, Scott and Audrey run into the campground pointing fingers at Theo and Hugo. The four quarrel for a minute and get heated yelling things at each other. It's obvious that Theo and Hugo don't understand what their claim is. Off-scene, Hugo says "I think they are accusing Theo of killing his dog for the hotdog competition. Floyd is right here though". He picks up the dog and shows it to the camera. It cuts to Audrey on camera who says, "Did we get heated? Yes. Did Theo kill a person. Absolutely. Did he plead guilty? No." She frowns at the camera.

Scene 4 (A/B stories resolve)

Scott yells at Theo, "Here I thought you were a decent person!" He reaches into the bin of hotdogs and begins to throw them at Theo. One hits Theo in the face and he calmly picks it up and throws it at Scott. The two continue to throw the dogs at each other until Audrey is hit in the crossfire and so she throws one at Hugo. Soon the entire camp is throwing hot dogs at each other and hurling insults. Offscreen Scott stands in front of the camera with mustard and ketchup all over his face and tells the camera, "I'm ashamed of calling myself a Camp Director." Then suddenly he looks over at Hugo and heatedly says, "No Hugo, this does not compare to my proposal... AT ALL!!". Theo is shown on-camera and is also drenched in ketchup, mustard, mud, and has a hotdog in his hair. He says, "Honestly haven't had this much fun since the Pink Floyd concert" and grags the hot dog out of his hair and eats it. Audrey comes on screen and states, "Did we perform a citizen's arrest of Theodore Willis? No. Frankly, our initial findings fell through when I realized a serial killer would never have a food fight unless it was with cereal. So we dropped the charges". The group gives each other handshakes at the end of the day and take selfies with the hotdog mess.

Scene 5

During an early morning we see Theo digging a hole near some trees. He then walks behind his trailer. Holding a big bag he drags it over to the hole and covers it up. Then he goes over to his garden and pulls up a carrot and eats it.




